### **Two Theories of Morphology, One Implementation**

Process morphology retain an "escape mechanism" in the form of allomorphy rules to treat phonologically conditioned allomorphs which cannot be readily derived by ordinary phonological rules Because allomorphy rules are able to model virtually any kind of Aronoff (1976), Zwicky (1985) and Anderson (1992), among others
